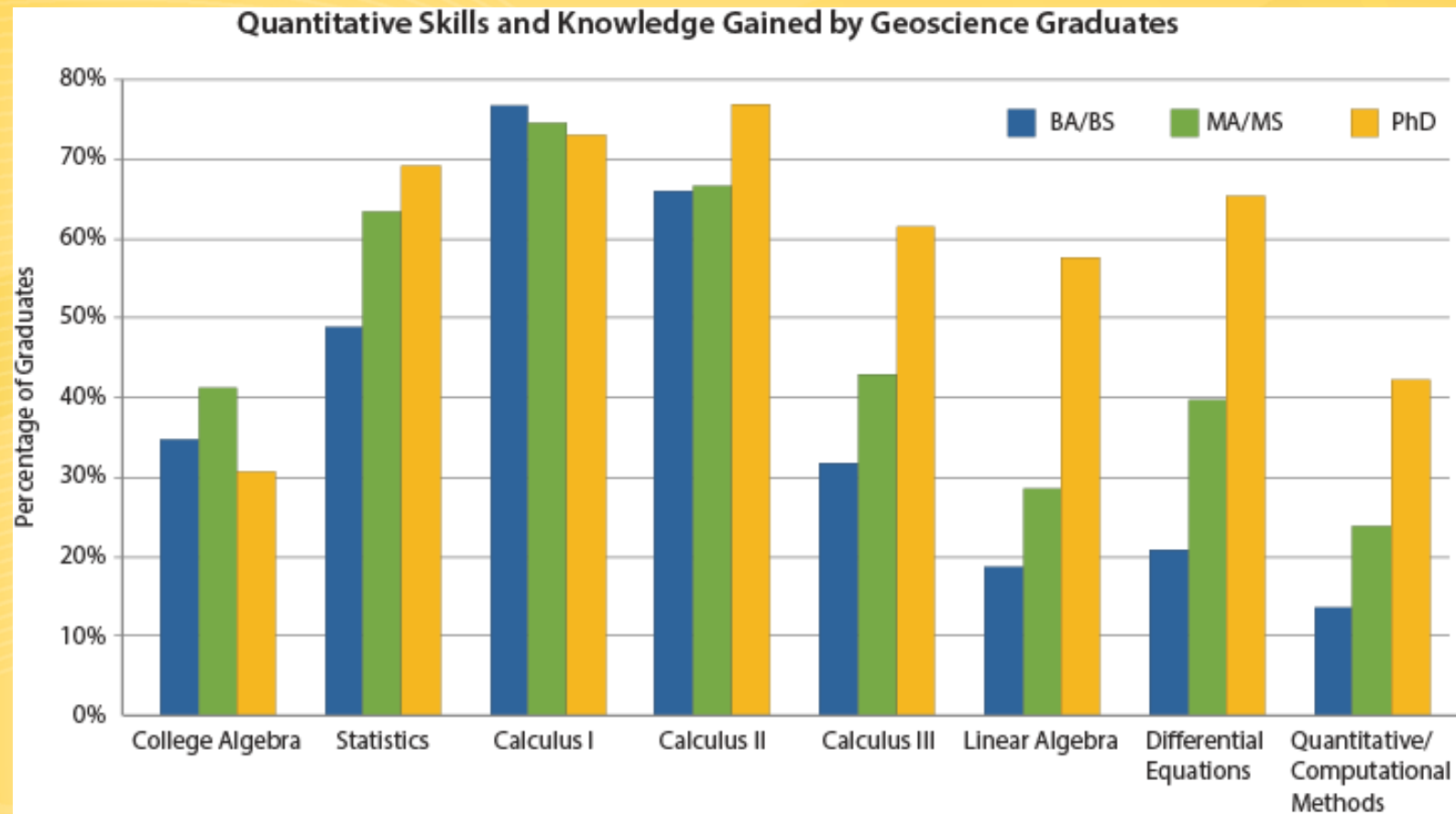
- Long-term Employment Projections Remain Strong

2014 Geoscience Student Exit Survey Report

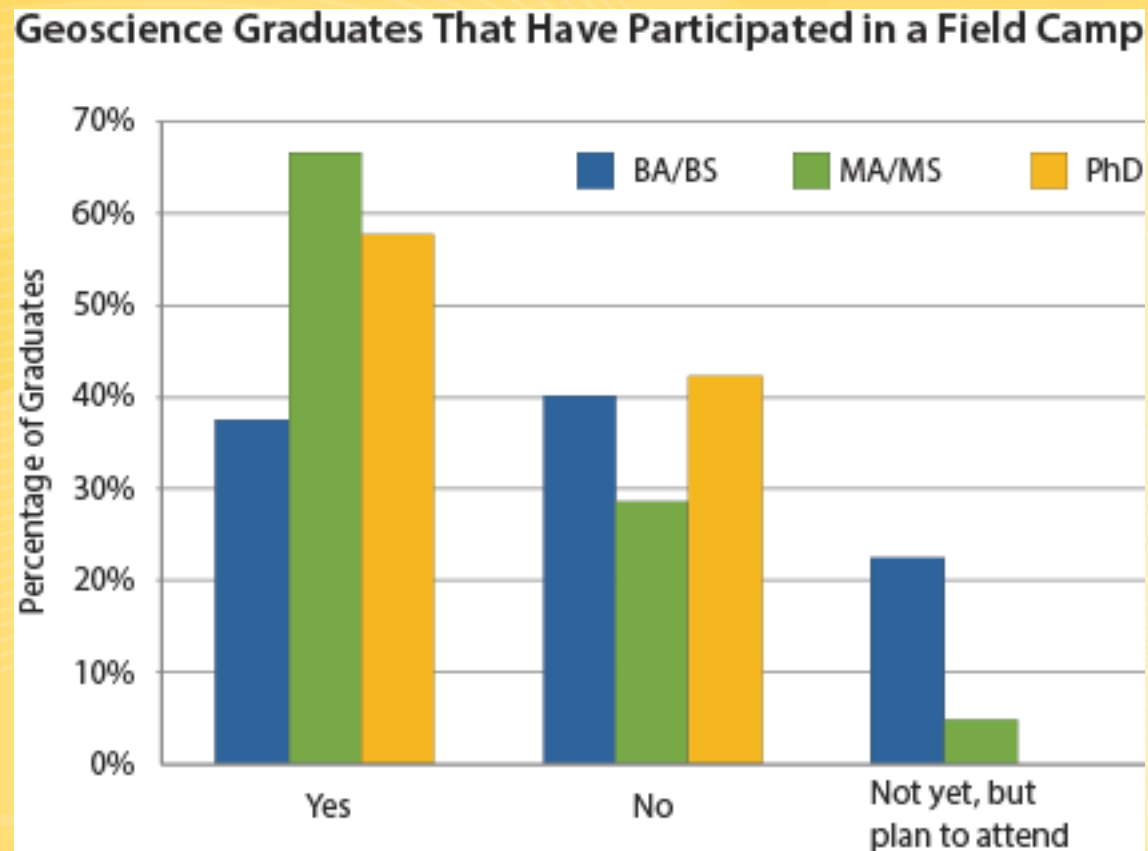
- Record response: ~400 participating departments

Math Skills Remain Weak

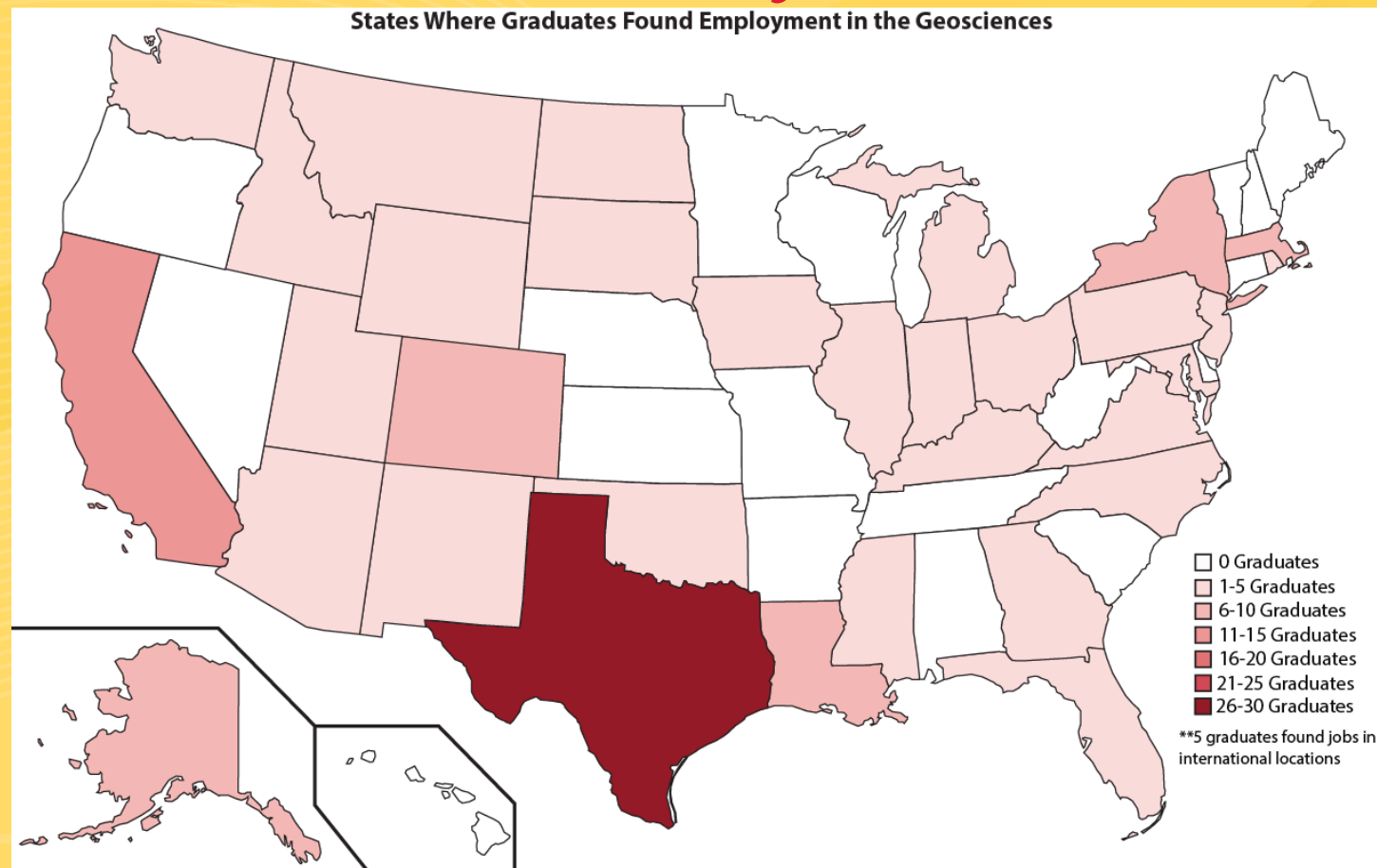
