

Vogel was a professor at Harvard from 1967-2000. He succeeded John Fairbank to become the second Director of Harvard's East Asian Research Center and second Chairman of the Council for East Asian Studies. From fall 1993 to fall 1995, Vogel took a two-year leave of absence from Harvard to serve as the National Intelligence Officer for East Asia at the National Intelligence Council in Washington. Vogel is the author of many books and numerous professional and journalistic writings. Among his publications are: Japan As Number One, 1979, which in Japanese translation became a best seller in Japan, and Deng Xiaoping and the Transformation of China, 2011, which in Chinese translation became a best seller in China. He has lectured frequently in Asia, in both Chinese and Japanese. In 1983, Prof. Vogel was invited by Wittenberg as the Convocation speaker and received an honorary degree (doctor of letters).



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
