Delivery

1. Submitted in Canvas, with your last name in the file name. Example "lastname_module#.docx"
2. Length between 750-800 words (excluding figure legends). No more, no less.
3. Letter-to-Editor should have proper grammar and punctuation and follow the style guidelines posted on the Canvas site.

Content

4. Letter-to-Editor should identify and evaluate one of the major claims in the news article.
5. Introduce a relevant, more recent, media claim in your Letter-to-Editor. Use this new media claim to contextualize your perspective in the Letter-to-Editor.
6. Letter-to-Editor should be defensible given the data you present (this can be data in the graphic or data you reference in the text).

Graphics

7. At least one data graphic that illustrates a main point in your Letter-to-Editor.
8. The graphic(s) should have clearly labeled axes and legends, and be aesthetically pleasing.
9. Additional graphic(s) that use new data that complement data in videos and is relevant to the main point in your Letter-to-Editor.
10. The graphic(s) should have a figure caption below the graphic that explains the graphic. Start your caption with a brief, explanatory title. The figure caption should stand on its own (not dependent on the text in your Letter-to-Editor to understand it), and be less than 100 words.
